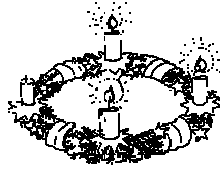

**Third Sunday
of Advent**

The Third Sunday of Advent, like the Fourth Sunday of Lent, is a day of joy in the midst of a penitential season. We continue our Advent journey, but we come to a vantage point from which we can see what lies ahead - Christmas joy. This Sunday is called Gaudete Sunday (meaning "rejoice") because of the first words of the Entrance Antiphon for today, from St. Paul's letter to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near" (Philippians 4:4-5). The word *rejoice* comes up again and again in the readings and prayers for today.

LECTIONARY

■ **THE GOSPEL:** The Gospel according to John does not mention any of the details about the Baptist which Mark gave us last Sunday - his camel's hair clothing, his leather belt, his unusual diet. In the Gospel according to John, John the Baptist simply comes to give "testimony" (John 1:7) to the light, that is, to Christ. The priests test him - clearly, they are afraid he has come to threaten their hegemony in religious matters. But the Baptist tells them point-blank, "I am not the Christ" (1:20). When they press him, he tells them that he is "*the voice of one crying out in the desert*" (1:23), the forerunner Isaiah foretold. And when they still do not understand, John tells them that there is "one among you whom you do not recognize" (1:26). The one they are looking for, the one they are afraid of is already here.

■ **FIRST READING:** The First Reading is from Third Isaiah. In the Gospel, Jesus applies this reading to himself. After his baptism and temptation in the desert, Jesus took the scroll and read this passage to the people. The servant of the Lord is both prophet (gifted with the spirit) and king (anointed by the Lord). His mission is to those society looks down on-the poor, the brokenhearted, the captive, the prisoner. He brings a jubilee, a time for forgiveness, a "year of favor" (Isaiah 61:2). The servant is also filled with joy. God will make "justice and praise" (61:11) spring from the earth as naturally as plants grow in a garden.

■ **PSALM:** Mary's song of rejoicing, the Magnificat.

■ **SECOND READING:** From Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians likewise urges us to rejoice, to pray, to give thanks, and to listen. We are not to "quench the Spirit" (1 Thessalonians 5:19); rather, we are to test everything and keep what is good. This way we may grow in holiness and be ready for the coming of the Lord.

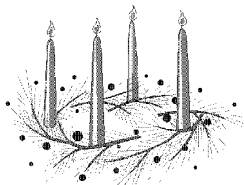

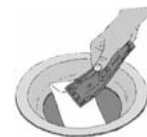

HISTORY OF ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS



The roots of Advent go much deeper than Christianity. They reach deep into the thirsty soil of Israel, and into the dreams of God's chosen people. The word "Advent" itself means "Coming", but it has taken on the nuances of waiting and expectation. And in that sense, we can say that Advent began outside the gates of Eden.

During Advent, we join our voices in a special way with the people of Israel. The Old Testament readings on the Sundays of Advent recall our deepest roots, a people-in-waiting. A great majority of these readings come from one remarkable collection, the Book of the Prophet Isaiah. Isaiah is the poet of the Promise, and his words provide us with a whole treasury of Advent-Christmas images. It was Isaiah who envisioned a "peaceable kingdom", where the lion and the lamb lie down together under a child's leadership. And it was Isaiah who first gave the Messiah the name by which He would be known through all the waiting years: Emmanuel, "God-with-us".

When we look at the roots of Advent in the early years of Christianity, we find a gap. The early Church did not celebrate Advent at all--which is really no surprise, because they didn't celebrate Christmas, either! In those first centuries, Jesus' death and Resurrection were the central experiences of Christianity --especially while Christians themselves were meeting persecutions and death for their beliefs.

In the third century, as Christians was finally allowed to flourish, the Church found room for more light-hearted feasts. No one knew, however, on what day Jesus had actually been born - and to make matters worse, there were many different ways of reckoning time, and no centralized calendar.

In the middle of the fourth century, Pope Julius settled on December 25th. It is possible that he chose this date because it fell so close to the Winter Solstice an ancient feast familiar to so many converts to Christianity. The Roman worshippers of Mithras, with whom Pope Julius was familiar, celebrated December 25th as "The Birthday of the Unconquered Sun" - a title that certainly suited itself to the Nativity.

Christmas itself didn't come to be called Christmas until much later. Some of the early names for this feast were Epiphany (manifestation), Natale (birth), and interestingly enough - Adventus (the coming).

During the fifth century, Christians in Ravenna, Italy, began experimenting with the liturgy of preparation for Christmas, which they called "Advent". The liturgies developed in Ravenna found their way to Rome in the sixth century, where they were printed in the Celesian Sacramentary, one of the earliest collections of prayers and readings chosen for liturgical use.

In about the ninth century, the first Sunday of Advent became the first Sunday of the Church's liturgical year. The tension between penitence and joy, promise, and waiting which marked the Advent liturgies gave rise to many rich customs and traditions.

The revised Roman Catholic Calendar of 1970 called the Church back to the original Roman understanding of Advent as a period of "joyful and spiritual expectation", not a penitential season

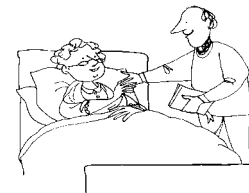
