*17th Sunday
in Ordinary Time*

*“And I tell you,
ask and you shall receive;
seek and you shall find;*

knock and the door will be opened to you.”

(Luke 11:1-13)

We are halfway through Luke, through Colossians, through summer, and halfway through Ordinary Time.

FIRST READING:

Abraham’s boldness and God’s justice meet in a dialogue of compassion. In his boldness Abraham fears provoking God’s anger, but he discovers only mercy. The God who draws near to his people to gain intimate knowledge of them rejoices in Abraham, who calls for justice for the innocent.

RESPONSORIAL:

In Psalm 138 the Church gives full voice to her faith that God hears and answers the prayer of the needy and of those who place their hope in him.

SECOND READING:

The letter to the Colossians points to Baptism as an invitation into the death and Resurrection of the Lord. We are given the gift of new life as the power of sin over us is nailed to the cross. In the waters of Baptism the gift of redemption, secured in the Lord’s death, transforms the life of the individual welcomed into the Church.

GOSPEL:

If there was ever a cosmic negotiation, it is the Lord’s Prayer. First, we praise God, and then we list our petitions: We need food, please. Oh, and forgiveness; and please do not make the temptations harder than we can bear. Amen.

In return, we offer the assertion that we also forgive those who do us wrong, and we are nowhere near as just as God. But Jesus knows we are not as good as our intentions. He adds the little story about the man who will not help his neighbor out of friendship but will capitulate in the end out of exasperation. That is more like us. We forgive those who wrong us because it is often more practical to do so. Even psychology tells us that we have a personal investment in forgiveness: It is the healthy choice, over the gradual descent into mental illness which comes from holding a grudge.

What makes God God is that God does not need a reason or motivation to forgive us. If we ask, if we seek, if we knock, we will be served. That is a cosmic negotiation worth pursuing.




ST. IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA

Founder of the Jesuits
Feast Day: July 31, 2010

Spanish nobility. Youngest of twelve children. Page in the Spanish court of Ferdinand and Isabella. Military education. Soldier, entering the army in 1517, and serving in several campaigns. Wounded in the leg by a cannonball at the siege of Pampeluna on 20 May 1521, an injury that left him partially crippled for life. During his recuperation the only books he had access to were *The Golden Legend*, a collection of lives of the saints, and the *Life of Christ* by Ludolph the Carthusian. These books, and the time spent in contemplation, changed him.

On his recovery he took a vow of chastity, hung his sword before the altar of the Virgin of Montserrat, and donned a pilgrim's robes. Lived in a cave from 1522 to 1523, contemplating the way to live a Christian life. Pilgrim to Rome and the Holy Land in 1523, where he worked to convert Muslims. In 1528 he began studying theology in Barcelona, Alcalá, and Paris, receiving his degree on 14 March 1534. His meditations, prayers, visions and insights led to forming the *Constitutions* of the *Society of Jesus* on 15 August 1534; it received papal approval in 1541. Friend of James Lainez, Alonso Salmerón, Nicholas Bobadilla, Simón Rodríguez, Blessed Peter Faber, and Saint Francis Xavier, the group that formed the core of the new *Society*. He never used the term *Jesuit*, which was coined as an insult by his opponents; the *Society* today uses the term with pride. He traveled Europe and the Holy Lands, then settled in Rome to direct the Jesuits. His health suffered in later years, and he was nearly blind at death.

SAINTS JOACHIM AND ANNE

Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary
and
Grandparents of Jesus
Mon, July 26, 2010



In the scriptures, Matthew and Luke furnish a legal family of Jesus, tracing ancestry to show that Jesus is the culmination of great promises. His mother's family is not only neglected, but we know nothing factual about them except that they existed. Even the names of Joachim and Anne come from a legendary source written more than a century after Jesus died.

The heroism and holiness of these people, however, is inferred from the whole family atmosphere around Mary in the Scriptures. Whether we rely on the legends about Mary's childhood or make guesses from the information in the Bible, we see in her a fulfillment of many generations of prayerful persons, herself steeped in the religious traditions of her people.

The strong character of Mary making decisions, her continuous practice of prayer, her devotion to the laws of her faith, her steadiness at moments of crisis, and her devotion to her relatives - all indicate a close-knit family that looked forward to the next generation even while retaining the best of the past.

Joachim and Anne - whether these are their real names or not - represent that entire quiet series of generations who faithfully perform their duties, practice their faith, and establish an atmosphere for the coming of the Messiah, but remain obscure.

Comment: This is the feast of "grandparents". It reminds grandparents of their responsibility to establish a tone for generations to come. They must make the traditions live and offer them as a promise to little children. But the feast has a message for the younger generation as perspective, depth of experience, and appreciation of life's profound rhythms are all part of wisdom not to be taken lightly or ignored.

Quote: "The family is the foundation of society. In it the various generations come together and help one another to grow wise and to harmonize personal rights with the other requirements of social life."
